My Eye Hurts

PPE when grinding - why bother?

The other day I was using a slitting disc in the 4½" angle grinder to open up the expansion gap between railway track sections. I was working outside and only needed to use the grinder for 30 seconds, so it was hardly worth putting on goggles over my glasses, or was it? A small spark blew around the corner of my glasses and landed in my eye. No big deal, just a bit of grit in my eye. Later that afternoon it was annoying me so I tried to rub it out, pulled the eyelids up and down, flushed it out with an eyebath etc. but it wouldn't budge. No worries I thought – it'll probably work itself out.

That evening I was talking to an optician friend of mine and just mentioned in passing that I had a bit stuck in my eye. She said "YOU MUST GO TO A&E OR BRISTOL EYE HOSPITAL FIRST THING TOMORROW MORNING". Okay, okay I thought, keep your hair on! But being a good boy I phoned the eye hospital next morning and they told me to expect up to a 4 hour wait! So I went to South Bristol walk-in centre instead. They put some anaesthetic drops in my eye and then told me it would sting a bit. When I came back down off the ceiling he put some more drops in then wiped the steel fragment off my eyeball with a cotton bud. "Ah" he said ominously, "there's a rust ring left on the surface of the eyeball. We need to get that off or there is a risk of ulceration and bigger problems developing. I'll just scrape it off the eyeball with the end of a needle". Which he did. And then he wiped the eyeball swarf away with another cotton bud. Which was OK at the time, but not a lot of laughs once the anaesthetic wore off.

I now have to put Chloramphenicol antibiotic ointment in my eye every 4 hours, and I'll just share a couple of extracts from the side-effects leaflet with you:

- Burning or stinging in or around the eye
- Difficulty in breathing
- Unconsciousness
- Very occasionally, these effects cannot be reversed and have been fatal

Oh, nothing much to worry about there then!

So the moral of this story is always wear proper PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) – it saves time in the long run and hurts less.
